- Believe in dialogue as a conflict resolution and change mechanism












Gen-Z Sees Climate Change Through the Lens of **Environmental Justice**

Students in Emily Burchfield's "Environmental Data Science" class are there to crunch the numbers. However, in its last iteration — as part of the Arts & Social Justice (ASJ) Fellows program — students were solving for questions that defy a quantitative answer.

A partnership among Emory College of Arts and Sciences, Emory Center for Ethics and Emory Arts, the ASJ program brings Atlanta artists into Emory classrooms to help students translate their learning into creative activism in the name of social justice. This year, seven artists partnered with faculty in Emory College of Arts and Sciences, Laney Graduate School, Nell Hodgson Woodruff School of Nursing and Candler School of Theology to co-teach existing courses.

Scientific Sources


- Based in climate science and learned through formal education e.g., IPCC
- Understands climate in a scientific, objective contexts
- Acquires knowledge of the natural environment throug h hypothesis, theories, and models

Traditional Sources

- Based in collective social and cultural knowledge e.g., Indigenous wisdom
- Understands climate through an intersectional context
- Achieves connectedness with nature through deliberate environmental behavior



Priorities Vary for Youth Environmental Leaders

If student leaders could act on a single environmental issue tomorrow, it would be...

"Gen-Z are incredibly passionate about environmental issues and others as well who are often marginalized or excluded from having a say in political elections...[I would] address voter disenfranchisement."

"Expanding renewable energy infrastructure and better public transportation."

"A focus on **job creation**...from the more immediate understanding of job creation in renewable energy but also in a broader perspective of how things like the care economy and the education sector represent crucial, low-carbon economic sectors for society."

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A New Communications Framework for Climate Discourse

- 1. Identify how media narratives around climate change may or may not play into generational preferences for discourse
- 2. Explore digital narratives of climate change
- 3. Know Gen-Z's priority concerns (social justice and racism)
- 4. Deepen awareness of new and traditional knowledge forms
- 5. Anticipate differences among specific climate actions within Gen-Z
